The outlook is upbeat for Rattler Basketball 1997-98, as the Rattlers have seemingly emerged from the long nightmare of recent years under the patient hand of Coach Mickey Clayton.

Clayton, a 1975 graduate of FAMU, served a 35-game stint, plus two months as interim coach, before receiving a three-year commission in May as the permanent head coach.

A stickler for intense pressure defense and an uptempo, transition style offense, Clayton brings a 209-163 career coaching record at Florida A&M, which includes a 12 1/2-year stint as the school's women's coach (1977-90).

That the Rattlers won 10 of their last 35 games might seem unworthy of a three-year permanent status contract, until you consider that during that same span, FAMU won 10 of 16 conference games. Contrast that with a 5-36 league standard in the previous 2 1/2 seasons (over 73 games)

and one can see the improvement wrought by Clayton.

As the Chicago Bulls revolve around Michael Jordan, the Rattlers will revolve in part around massive 7-1 senior postman Jerome James.

The personable giant from Tampa, has been among the nation's leaders in blocked shots (238 in the last 54 games) the past two seasons and should be the preseason choice for MEAC Player of the Year.

James averaged 16.1 points and 9.0 rebounds per game, upping his field goal percentage to 53.0 overall. In league play, he averaged 17.4 points and 9.2 rebounds with 88 blocked shots (18 games) and a nifty 57.7 shooting touch.

He'll be joined in the frontcourt by 6-10 junior center-forward Kevin George, a JUCO performer from Massachusetts. George, 6-9 junior Herb Woodard, 6-8 senior forward Olatunda Martin and 6-6 junior Derrick Magee make perhaps the biggest and deepest frontline group the Rattlers

have had in a number of years.

The Rattler backcourt may be the most talented and versatile a group assembled in many years. The loss of would-be senior Guy Walton will likely make 5-9 JUCO transfer Willie Bullock, who played at Newberry (Mass.) CC, the leading contender at the point.

Also in the point chase could be sophomore Frank Oliver and freshman Morris Scott, all youngsters who also have the versatility to play the one or two.

The two guard spot should be loaded too with 6-3 JUCO All-America Monroe Pippen heading the list, along with freshman All-Dade County Kendric Green a 6-6 swingman type, 6-3 sophomore Travis Grant, III, and 6-5 junior Norris Fletcher all set to battle each other for precious playing time.

For the Rattlers to improve even more dramatically recordwise, FAMU must win on the road. All of the Rattlers' victories last season were in the cozy confines of Gaither Gymnasium (8-19, 8-10 in MEAC), while on the road, FAMU has managed just two wins in the last four years.


The schedule will again challenge early and often, with road games at Long Beach State (Nov. 15), Fresno State (Nov. 17), Jacksonville (Fla.) University (Nov. 20), Auburn (Dec. 6), Purdue (Dec. 22) and MEAC Champion Coppin State (Dec. 16), the upset specialists in last year's NCAA Tournament.

FAMU has a rare home-and-home deal in the same year with Jacksonville, playing there November 20 and hosting the Dolphins, December 2. The Rattlers round out the schedule with two Division One home games prior to Christmas, as they host Troy (Ala.) State, Nov. 25 and Jacksonville.

In addition to serving as the host team in the Capital City Classic, the Rattlers must also face a full complement of 18 league games in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference, a league which saw nine of the 10 teams separated by a mere six games in the standings.

Should Coach Clayton be able to smoothly blend his returning veterans with the high-caliber newcomers, the Rattlers could be in position to contend for an upper division finish in the MEAC.

And after last year, when the Rattlers lost two overtime road conference games, that may not be such a stretch since the Rattlers' 8-10 finish left them just one game out of fourth place in the improving MEAC.





# With....

# Coach Mickey Clayton

#### Q Size up this 1997-98 Rattler Basketball team.

A This team will be one that has more players that like to run the floor, shoot the jumper and play good solid defense. But most importantly, we hope we'll be a group that will never say die - never give up.

#### Q Has becoming the men's coach at FAMU been the realization of a dream for you?

A It is something I hoped would have happened early on in my career (as women's coach), but later I wasn't sure it would ever happen. Being coach here makes it easier to relate to the current players some of the traditions of Rattler Basketball first hand.

## Q Talk about your new staff - Clemon Johnson and Ronnie Bryant - and what they bring to the FAMU coaching mix.

A With these two, I was able to secure persons with high school and junior college experience here in Florida. That should really help our recruiting in the region. Coach Johnson is an intense, outgoing person, while Coach Bryant is more reserved and observant. This gives us a balance and allows our players to find at least one member of the staff they can feel comfortable with.

#### Q What is your ultimate goal for the Rattler Basketball Program?

A I'd like for us to be the first historically Black school to reach the Sweet 16. I really want to return the program to its' past glory, but that's going to take a lot of hard work and support.

#### Q What coaches have had any influence on shaping your coaching style and/or philosophy?

A Several coaches have been influential over the years. I learned a lot about the game from my father, who coached high school basketball and played here in the 1950s. Coach (Rock) Ogelsby stressed the uptempo game and Coach Ajac Triplett was a solid bench coach, who made good in-game adjustments. I learned a lot about pressure defenses from Rick Pitino and I got much of my man-to-man defenses from Bobby Knight.

#### Q How has the public response been so far to you as men's coach?

A So far its' been very positive, very supportive. Folks have offered to do anything they can to help us. I know it will be a while before the fans really get behind us. We have to demonstrate that we'll be a competitive team that won't give up, that will battle to the end. Then I believe the fans will embrace the team emotionally.

#### Q How has recruiting gone for you so far and

what type of player are you looking for?


A We are beginning to get more depth in the program now, which will help us during a long season. We are looking for athletes, especially athletes who like to run the floor, shoot the jumper and basically have a never say die kind of attitude.

#### Q How does the conference stack up this season?


A This league is improving tremendously, but the two programs that will be the favorites will be the two with coaching staff that have been around a while -Coppin State and South Carolina State.


#### Q Did the preseason magazine predictions of improvement prove encouraging?

A Yes, I was very happy with some of the preseason predictions. At FAMU, we want to get back to the tradition of expecting to be good. We're just going to have to get after it and win a few and position ourselves to get back to that competitive level.

Clearly the best NBA prospect from Florida A&M University since current assistant Clemon Johnson plied his trade in the paint for the Rattlers in the late 1970s, **James** has established himself as a man to watch this season, after several impressive showings in two summer camps....

A preseason All-Conference pick, who was named to **DICK VITALE'S "Human Eraser" Team** and rated as one of the top big men in the country, **James** should come into his own this season,

especially with an improved supporting cast....

# A Season In Review Rattlers Turn The Corner

The Florida A&M Rattlers appeared to have turned the proverbial corner in the 1996-97 season, going from a rugged 0-9 start to an 8-19 finish which truly seemed to signal better days ahead for Coach Mickey Clayton and Company.

Clayton, who took over the program on a interim basis with eight games left in the 1995-96 campaign, continued his yeoman's effort of turning around the attitude as well as the play of the Rattler Basketball Program in his first full season.

And while the final record might not indicate a reversal of fortune is in the offing, several items resulting from last year's campaign may indeed bode well for the future:

**@ITEM -** Clayton was named permanent head coach in May, getting a three-year contract from the university.

**@ITEM -** FAMU posted its' best home record, 8-1, since the 1992-93 season, which energized the Rattler faithful in January and February.

**QITEM -** The Rattlers pulled off a stunning 86-82 upset of eventual conference champion Coppin State in Tallahassee in February, showing that the Rattlers' attitude might be moving to a more positive one.

While Clayton's permanent coaching status came after FAMU's strong finish - and deservedly so - there were some players who did some grunt work to put some luster on the Rattler season.

• Junior center Jerome James, the 7-1 Tampa Bay native who is capable of dominating any game, showed tremendous improvement as the season went along, scoring a career-high 38 points - the most by a Rattler since FAMU went Division One in 1990 - against Delaware State.

The Black College All-America and the first-team All-Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference selection, finished ranked fourth nationally in blocked shots (119) and led the club in scoring (16.1) and rebounding (9.0). James led the club in scoring in 11 games and in rebounding 17 times, turning in a triple double against Hampton.

Against the visiting Pirates of Hampton on February 5, James finished with 20 points, 10 rebounds and 10 blocked shots in the 89-78 win.

•Senior forward Sean Black, who had endured four and five-win seasons as a freshman and sophomore, averaged 14.4 points, 6.1 rebounds per game with 30 three-point goals, providing great leadership as FAMU began its' late season surge.

He was the leading scorer in five of the Rattlers' big wins down the stretch, highlighted by a 22-point effort in FAMU's upset of Coppin State, February 15 and a 27-point outbreak against Auburn.

- Freshman guard Darryl Labarrie (who transferred in the offseason to Georgia Tech) earned MEAC All-Rookie honors, averaging 12.1 points, 3.4 rebounds, finishing second in three-pointers (24) and assists (63).
- •Mercurial point guard Guy Walton, who became eligible in the second semester, was a pivotal performer for the Rattlers during their rousing finish. He topped the club in assists (91) and steals

(41) and his emotional play sparked FAMU, especially in wins over South Carolina State (17 points) and Howard (21 points).

Florida A&M without question had sunk to the depths of Division One basketball, ranking 305 of 309 teams when the season began. Add to that the uncertainty of the coaching situation and a rugged non-conference schedule which featured several NCAA Tournament teams and one had the makings for another dismal season.

The Rattlers opened against the likes of Alabama-Birmingham, Auburn, Xavier of Ohio and South Alabama, playing well in spots, but lacking the consistency to finish many of their opponents.

But Clayton and his staff, which included his beloved father, Mack, a former Rattler cage star of the 1950s and energetic young aide Charles Fisher, tirelessly worked to instill a more positive attitude and install a system of uptempo offense and a dizzying array of pressure defenses.

Their hard work bore fruit in the Rattlers' late season run featuring a three-game winning streak - the first such run in almost five years, and an 8-10 conference mark - their best finish (fifth) in the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference since the 1992-93 season.

With James and many of the key reserves and/or first-time players returning from last year's crew, the Rattlers may indeed look back on the 1996-97 campaign as the year the Rattlers began their climb back onto the competitive plain of Division One basketball.





# MICKEY CLAYTON

#### Head Men's Basketball Coach

#### Florida A&M '75 • Third Year

On May 2, 1997, a dream was realized. Michael "Mickey' Clayton, a second generation Rattler

Basketballer earned what literally could be considered a battlefield promotion upon being named permanent men's basketball coach at Florida A&M University.

And the road to that battlefield promotion was one filled with days and nights of frustration and uncertainty as Clayton fought to hold true to the vision of the Rattler Basketball program as it once was - during the times of his father Mack in the 1950s and his own playing days in the mid 1970s.

Getting the current program, whose fortunes had sagged to the depths of Division One basketball after a nifty run of success in the late 1980s and early 1990s, back to a competitive level would be a daunting task for anyone.

But Clayton may indeed be the man for the job. In 1977, then-President Walter L. Smith asked Clayton, who was working at the school as a counselor, to take on the building of the women's basketball program at FAMU into a viable entity.

With virtually no recruiting budget and little more than a small stipend to speak of, Clayton took it upon himself to develop a network of contacts to help in recruiting. He travelled near and far in his personal car and at his own expense to build the Rattlerettes into one of the most formidable and feared programs in Division One.

As women's coach for 13 seasons, the energetic

mentor who hails from Melbourne, Florida, compiled a 199-138 record with two 20-win seasons and seven seasons of 18 or more victories.

His finest season was the 1985-86 campaign when his club won a Division One best 13 straight games,

capturing the New South Women's Conference regular season and tournament titles.

Clayton's women's teams were known for their uptempo offensive style which was fueled in large part by their dizzying array of defensive schemes ranging from intense man-to-man sets to various pressure and trapping sets.

His women's clubs scared the living daylights out of the women's basketball elite, upsetting the likes of Auburn, Mississippi State, Miami and Florida State, while challenging the likes of Georgia and Louisiana Tech during his tenure.

For his efforts, Clayton was enshrined in the Florida A&M University Sports Hall of Fame in 1996, along

with one of his All-Americas, sharpshooting guard Cynthia Lee.

In fact Lee is one of several Clayton products (Sybil Rivers, Claudette Farmer, Rosa Hudgins-

Browning) in the Hall.

"That was a special moment for me," Clayton recalls. "To be recognized for my contributions to the women's program really made me feel appreciated. To be honored with people like Bob Hayes, Rey Robinson and Jake Gaither in the Hall of Fame makes you feel real humble."

Once Clayton got into coaching, he entertained hopes of mentoring a men's basketball team on the college level. Obviously, the Florida A&M job would have been the ideal for this former Rattler.

"When I started coaching, I did hope to one day coach the men's program, but later on, I wasn't sure it would happen," reflected Clayton, who was reassigned by the university nine games into his 13th season as women's coach.

He worked in athletics as an assistant athletic director for facilities and NCAA compliance, bringing his considerable energy, creativity and his overwhelming desire to see the best happen for FAMU to bear on the demanding job.

By 1990 the itch to prowl the sidelines, to push and cajole basketball players to see the vision of basketball success that he himself had experienced began to to nip at him. Then men's coach Willie Booker of FAMU afforded Clayton a chance to get experience on a men's coaching staff.

The result was nothing short of a miracle as the Rattlers, which had had two trips to the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference Tournament finals in the three years prior to Clayton's joining the staff, stunned the league and the FAMU faithful by winning the 1991 tournament title.

Along the way, FAMU upset three of the tournament's top seeds including regular season champ Coppin State in the semifinals and second-seeded Delaware State in a thrilling overtime finals victory that capped off the biggest upset run in conference tournament history.

Although he interviewed for several men's coaching jobs in the intervening years, his dream of becoming a men's basketball coach was a dream deferred until the winter of 1996, when his alma mater once again called on Clayton to come to the rescue.

FAMU finished the final eight games of the 1995-96 season 2-6, finishing 8-19 overall. The Rattlers posted a seemingly identical 8-19 mark last season, Clayton's first full men's campaign, but the similarity ends with the numbers.

The Rattlers compiled their best home record (8-1) in four years and their 8-10 conference record allowed them to turn in their best league finish (5th) in five years.

An 86-82 win over eventual conference champion Coppin State (Feb. 15 at Tallahassee) cemented the feeling that FAMU had finally turned the corner and that Mickey Clayton was deserving of a chance at bringing the program all the way back.

Preseason magazines apparently shared in the school's confidence in their alumnus (Class of 1975), as the various publications picked FAMU to finish in the MEAC's upper division for the first time since 1992.

The Rattlers were picked to

finish as high as third to not lower than fifth in the 11-team league, which is another positive sign considering that until last season, the Rattlers had finished dead last three consecutive years (1994-95-96) after a run of luck that saw FAMU reach the MEAC finals four times in a five-year period.

Clayton's love for the game of basketball was probably passed down from his father, Mack, a star player for the Rattlers in the early

1950s.

The elder Clayton was a part of the 1952 Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title winners, who won the tournament with just four players against Alabama State in a now-fabled double overtime thriller.

Coach Mack, who coached in the Brevard County school system for over 20 years certainly instilled a drive to excel and a love for sports in his son, who was more into football and baseball during his formative years. "I really was into baseball so much that I knew starting lineups and batting averages of major league teams," the die-hard Cleveland Indians' fan recalls.

He didn't get into basketball until high school and that late start probably hurt the development of his talents.

But living with a coach didn't hurt the learning of the nuances of the game, lessons which have served him well in his own coaching experiences.

The past season and a half allowed him to work closely and spend a lot of time with his father, who volunteered to help his son's revival efforts. "It was really good to work with my dad during that time. It meant a lot to have someone to give you advice and meant so much to see former alumni and some of his

classmates get a chance to see him.

"Some of them hadn't seen each other since they left FAMU and that part of it - the time spent with him - made it all worthwhile," Clayton reflected.

As he prepares for his first season as permanent coach, Clayton has had time to reflect on those who were most influential on him as a coach.

"Being a graduate of FAMU, it is easy for me to explain to the players some of the traditions that make Rattler Basketball so special. Like reviving the attitude that our 1972 team had when they made a pact to not lose at home after our coach (Edward "Rockjaw" Ogelsby) had died.

"One of the reasons we use the south goal in the second half to this day is because it was under that goal or on that side of the gym where his (Ogelsby's) body was during the funeral. And we felt that goal was good luck for us," Clayton recalls.

"Coach Ogelsby believed in an uptempo game offensively and that's where a lot of my own philosophy came from.... Coach Ajac Triplett (Ogelsby's eventual successor) was a great bench coach, who really made good adjustments during the game.

"Much of the pressure defenses I learned from Rick Pitino (he attended New York Knicks' summer camps and studied tapes and other materials extensively) and my man-to-man stuff I took from Bobby Knight," Clayton explains.


During his days as women's coach, the FAMU crowds used to be some of the most vocal in their support of the Rattlerettes and they proved to be a big advantage to his teams during those years. Does he see a similar type of support building for his regime?

"For the most part, people have been supportive. Fans have stopped me in the street or in stores telling me to 'Hang in there Mickey. We know it's only a matter of time until you get things the way they need to be.' But I don't figure they'll really get behind us emotionally until we prove that we're a never say die team, that won't give up.

That's what won the fans over to our women's teams - our never say die attitude," Clayton says.


Now that his dream deferred - being men's coach at FAMU - is now a dream realized, what his his ultimate goal for the program, besides winning of course: "I would like for FAMU to be the first historically Black college to reach the Sweet 16. it would be a big step toward winning a national title and it would be something no team has ever done," Clayton says.

To reach that level of success, the Rattlers' mindset must, according to Clayton include a measure of expectancy. "We have to get back to the way we were traditionally at FAMU, where we expected to win period."

Florida A&M '81 • First Year


The all-time rebounding leader in FAMU history, Clemon "C.J." Johnson rejoined his old college basketball teammate, Mickey Clayton in his building of Rattler Basketball into a nationally competitive program.

Johnson, a native of nearby Monticello, Florida, came on board Clayton's staff in the summer, after serving as head boys' basketball coach at Quincy (Fla.) Shanks High School for three years (1995, 1996, 1997).

He returned to the Big Bend area after a long professional basketball career which spanned 15 years in the NBA and the Italian League. Drafted by the Portland Trailblazers in 1978, Johnson also played with Indiana (1979-83); the Philadelphia 76ers (1983-86), coming on board in time for their World title run with Julius Erving in 1983; Seattle Supersonics (1986-88) and from 1988 to 1993 in Italy.

Before assuming the head coaching job at Quincy Shanks, Johnson was an assistant boys coach at his prep alma mater, Florida A&M High School for one season (1994-95).

Johnson had 1,494 career rebounds at FAMU (1975-78) and still holds single-season (412 in 1977-78) and single-game (25, vs. Morris Brown, 2-9-76). He also averaged 12.3 points per game during his career, ranking among the school's top 15 scorers all time. He holds a bachelor's degree in Economics from FAMU (1981).


A former standout backcourt ace for Florida International University, Bryant will bring an high level of enthusiasm and experience to both coaching and recruiting duties here at Florida A&M.





Established in 1970, the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference, is made up of 10 schools with a common purpose - that of pursuing competitive excellence on the NCAA Division One level.

Guided by Commissioner Charles Harris, the MEAC has seen its'

overall competitive level improve in recent years to the point that eight sports (football, baseball, men's basketball, men's tennis, women's volleyball, women's basketball, women's tennis and women's softball) will be sending teams to NCAA championship play this school year.

The league is in its' 27th year of operation, and member schools include Bethune-Cookman College (Daytona Beach, Fla.), Coppin State College

(Baltimore, Md.), Delaware State College (Dover, Del.), Florida **A&M University** (Tallahassee, Fla.),

Hampton University (Hampton, Va.), Howard University (Washington, D.C.), the University of Maryland at Eastern Shore (Princess Anne, Md.), Morgan State University (Baltimore, Md.), Norfolk State University (Norfolk, Va.), North Carolina A&T State University (Greensboro, N.C.) and South Carolina State University (Orangeburg, S.C.).

The league's tournament title winner receives an automatic bid into the NCAA Division One Tournament and several years, the conference had sent a representative to the National Invitational Tournament.

After a bit of a nomadic existence the past three years (Baltimore, Tallahassee, Norfolk), the MEAC Tournament has found a home for the next three years - Richmond, Virginia. Both the men's and women's tournaments will be staged in this basketball hotbed.

Coppin State College has been the dominant men's program in the 1990s, winning or sharing eight of the last nine regular season MEAC titles and they reign as the defending regular season

(visitation) and tournament champs.

However, the all-time kingpin of the league is **North Carolina A&T**, whose men's teams have won **11 regular season titles** and **15 tournament championships**, highlighted by seven straight tournament titles from 1982 through 1988.

Coppin State, under the demanding taskmaster Ron "Fang" Mitchell has won or shared the last five regular season titles, sharing the crown in 1996 with South Carolina

State.

**CSC** stunned the NCAA elite last season in the NCAA Tournament, upsetting second-seeded **South Carolina** in the opening round and falling to **Texas** in the second round by a hair, after rallying from an 18-point second half deficit.

For Florida A&M, which appears in the early throes of a renaissance under current head coach Mickey Clayton, the 1991 season was their lone tournament championship

season.

**FAMU** knocked off three of the tournament's top four seeds including Coppin State, to win the crown.

Florida A&M has been the dominant athletic program overall in the league since their return in 1987, having captured seven (7) men's all-sports trophies and six (6) women's all-sports crown since 1988.








## Florida A&M Basketball Historical

Florida A&M's men's basketball has always played second fiddle to football, a program which has brought national attention to the university's athletic endeavors.

Still, men's basketball has its' own distinctive tradition, dating from its' formative years.

In those early days, basketball was played outdoors. Weather and seating problems, among others, limited attendance for the games, thus causing the game to develop slowly in popularity and player effectiveness.

In 1930, Intramural basketball and the annual State High School Tournament were inaugurated by FAMU Athletic Director **W. McKinley King** and faculty member **Albert S. Parks.** 

By 1932, the old college chapel had been remodeled, becoming the school's first gymnasium, seating 700.

The first college game in the new gym was against Alabama State Teachers' College (now Alabama State University). McKinley and his successor, **Theodore "Ted" Wright**, are credited with the advent and development of basketball at FAMU.

As the years passed, the FAMU basketball program became stronger and by the 1950's, it had become a success story all its'


own.

In 1952, probably the singular moment of

success for Rattler Basketball came in the finals of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Tournament.

Florida A&M captured the tournament title, with just four players - Thomas Hogan, Willie Irvin, Charlie White and John Cuyler - left due to foul outs. The "Famed Final Four," as they've come to be known, played the final 13-plus minutes (including two overtimes), besting Alabama State, 71-67, on their homecourt, for the crown.

Coach Edward "Rock" (or Rockjaw) Ogelsby, is considered

the greatest mentor in the school's basketball history. Ogelsby compiled an impressive 386-132

record at FAMU from 1950 through 1972, winning 13 SIAC titles.

After Ogelsby's death in 1972, the program continued to flourish under **Wendell Meeks** (17-9 in 1973) and **Ajac Triplett** (115-52 from 1973 to 1979).

Other than a 17-11 record in 1980-81, FAMU came up snakeyes in Division One under **James "Josh" Giles** (1980-83) and **Anthony Fields** (1983-84).

In fact, FAMU didn't have another winning season until 1987-88, then they posted a 22-8 record under coach **Willie Booker**, then in his fourth season.

That started a string of five straight winning seasons, which featured four second-place finishes in the last six years of Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference play; four tournament finals berths during the same half-decade, highlighted by a tournament championship in 1991.

But **Booker**, who compiled a 137-125 mark in nine seasons, was replaced following the 1993-94 season by

Ronald "Ron" Brown, who in three seasons (1994-96) compiled a 15-58 record.

Brown was relieved in February of 1996, with former Rattler Mickey Clayton (Class of '75)

taking the reins.

All-Star forward Leonard King


fires from top of key against

archrival Bethune-Cookman.

Named the permanent head coach in May 1997, **Clayton** piloted FAMU to a 10-25 record, but an 8-10 MEAC record in 1996-97, good for fifth place, the Rattler finish in five years.


Clayton, an energetic visionary who fashioned the FAMU Women's basketball program into one of the nation's most feared teams from 1977 to 1990, has dreams to returning the Rattlers to their former glory.

Rattler Basketball has yielded several star-caliber players: 1940's sharpshooter Samuel Hearns; former Harlem Globetrotters Tommy Mitchell and Leroy "Spike" Gibson (who later played in the NBA); Former Indiana Pacer Al Lawson, Sr., CBA star scorer Waite Bellamy; All-America guard Aldwin Ware, who led the nation in steals in 1988; and All-America forward DeLon Turner, the school's number two scorer and number three rebounder; and center Clemon Johnson, the school's all-time rebounder, who played professionally in the NBA and in Europe.



## Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University

### Tallahassee, Florida • Founded in 1887

Florida A&M University was founded on October 3, 1887, as the State Normal College for Colored Students, opening classes with fifteen students and two instructors. It's destiny: to become an institution of higher learning, striving toward even greater heights of academic excellence.

Today, Florida A&M University is one of nine institutions in the State University System, and excellence - "Excellence With

Caring" - remains its' goal.

Leading the State Normal College through its' infancy were two distinguished citizens and educators -Thomas DeSaille Tuckers, an outstanding attorney from Pensacola, and Thomas Van Rennasaler Gibbs, a state representative from Duval County (Jacksonville), as

Tucker's top assistant.

In 1891, the school received a share of the \$7,500 allocated to states for agricultural and mechanical education, and it was then that President Tucker initiated his plan for growth. The school was moved from Copeland Street, the present-day site of Florida State University, to its' current location, changing its' name to the State Normal and Industrial College for Colored Students.

By 1905, management of the school was transferred from the Board of Education to the Board of Control. This event proved significant because it officially designated the school as an

institution of higher education.

In 1909, the name was changed to Florida Agricultural and Mechanical College for Negroes (FAMC or FAMCEE). The following year, with an enrollment of 317 students, the college awarded its' first degrees.

During the years 1924 through 1944 under the administration of John Robert Edward Lee, Sr., Florida A&M acquired much of the physical and academic image

that it has today.


By 1944, Florida A&M had constructed 48 buildings, had accumulated 396 acres of land and had 812 students and 122 staff members. In 1949, under the leadership of William H. Gray, Jr. (1944-40), expansion, along with reorganization, continued and the school had obtained an Army ROTC unit. Student enrollment had grown by then to more than 2.000.

But perhaps the greatest achievement was the elevation of the school to university status in 1951. At the time, the school's name changed from Florida Agricultural and Mechanical College for Negroes to Florida Agricultural and Mechanical College. By legislative action in 1953, the school was renamed Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University

(FAMU).

During the years 1950-68, the school experienced its' most rapid growth. Twenty-three buildings were erected, the hospital (now the Foote-Hilyer Building) was completed, staff increased by more than 500, the four-quarter plan (now the semester plan) was implemented, and the school became the first Negro institution to become a member in the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Enrollment increased to over 3,500.

The 1970's brought further growth and development to Florida A&M University: in 1971, FAMU was recognized as a full partner in the nine-

university, public higher education system in Florida.

The 1980's served as a model for productive development for

Florida A&M University. Under the Walter L. Smith administration (1977-85), the University grew to eleven schools and colleges, plus a Division of Graduate Studies, Research and Continuing Education.

By 1984, the University was granted the authority to offer its' first Doctor of Philosophy degree, the Ph.D. in Pharmacology, while construction and renovation projects during the 1980s amounted to more than \$34 million.

Florida A&M consists of 13 colleges and schools of study, offering over 50 degrees ranging from bachelors' and masters' to a limited number of doctoral programs.

The University features Colleges of Arts and Sciences,

During its' 110 years of service, Florida A&M University has long boasted of being on the highest hill in Tallahassee.

Now the University can claim residence at the another apex as the TIME/ Princeton Review College Guide "College of the Year."

A panel of 10 experts in higher education reduced the list to six schools to be considered by the editors of the College Guide out of 1,250 institutions nationwide.

FAMU emerged as the "compelling choice" according to the editors.

The final six included UCLA, the University of Iowa, DePaul University in Chicago, DePauw University in Indiana and Trinity College in Connecticut and FAMU.

The editors cited FAMU's innovative programs, rising enrollment, surging SAT

scores,

producing the nation's largest number of African-American graduates, and the recruitment of National Achievement Scholars as the reason for the selection.

FAMU also impressed the editors as an institution that has become an elite alternative for African-Americans in the wake of the reversal of affirmative action laws.

"This unpreceedented

Education, Engineering Sciences, Technology and Agriculture, Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences and a joint Engineering College with Florida State University.

Schools of study within the University include Allied Health Sciences, Architecture, Business and Industry, General Studies, Graduate Studies, Research and Continuing Education, Journalism, Media and Graphic Arts, Nursing and the Environmental Sciences Institute.

At present, under the administration of Frederick S. Humphries (since 1985), enrollment has soared dramatically past the 10,000

mark (fall 1992) and the University is now leading the the nation in attracting National Merit Scholars.

Under the dynamic

leadership of Humphries, a magna cum laude graduate (1957), Florida A&M is moving forward into its' second century.

recognition for FAMU represents a powerful tribute to the men and women who in the beginning had more faith than resources, lived more on committment than compensation, and had enough vision to see that FAMU would overcome great odds to become one of the nation's leading universities," said FAMU President Frederick S. Humphries.

Among the University's recent accomplishments:

• FAMU was honored in August, when statistics released by Black Issues In Higher Education showed that FAMU was the No. 1 producer of black baccalaureates. During the past decade, SAT scores at FAMU have risen from below 800 to an average of 1036.

•FAMU was No. 1 in recruiting National Merit Scholars in 1992 and 1995.


• The School of Pharmacy was No. 1 in the Southeast for two consecutive years in National Institutes of Health funding, beating out Auburn and the University of Florida. In 1996, the college received \$2.7 million in NIH funding.

•FAMU is fourth among the 10 public universities in Florida in overall research grants, securing over \$35 million annually, and seventh overall in enrollment.

•FAMU's endowment (nearly \$40 million) is the largest of any historically black public college in the nation.

•FAMUhas grown from a campus with 5,101 students in the fall of 1985 to 10,781 in 1996.

# DR. FREDERICK HUMPHRIES University President

Frederick S. Humphries has the dual distinction of not only being the eighth president of Florida A&M University, but in 1997-98, he also enters the 12th year of his tenure.

He is a man with vision, possessing outstanding experience as an educator, and a determination and commitment to the pursuit of academic excellence.

A native of Apalachicola, Florida, he graduated magna cum laude, from Florida A&M in chemistry in 1957. He was awarded the Ph.D. degree in physical chemistry by the University of Pittsburgh in 1964.

His achievements at Florida A&M are numerous, including overseeing the school's expansion to a student body of just under 11,000; awarding the school's first Ph.D. degree; heading the

drive to lead the nation in the recruitment of National Merit Scholars; spearheading the school's efforts to increase grants and funding to its' numerous academic programs and leading the university to Time Magazine/Princeton Review's "College of the Year" honors in the Fall of 1997.



## KENNETH J. "Ken" RILEY Director of Athletics

In 1986, Ken Riley, a favorite son of Florida A&M, responded to the call to service of his alma mater and has responded with 11 years of energy, dedication and hard work toward taking the university's athletic program to a higher level.

In the summer of 1994, he was afforded that ultimate opportunity when he was promoted to Director of Athletics, a role he has served with distinction for the past three years.

His current role as CEO of FAMU Athletics is an ongoing challenge which is drawing upon all his varied life experiences as an administrator, coach and student-athlete. He oversees the operations of a 17-sport, multi-million dollar NCAA Division One program, which has been the finest in the Mid-Eastern

Athletic Conference over much of the past 10 years.

As head football coach at FAMU from 1986 to 1993, the Rattlers posted a 48-39-2 mark, with two Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference titles (1988,1990), and three seasons of NCAA Division 1-AA Top 20 finishes (1988, 1990, 1992). He was named MEAC Coach of the Year in 1988, 1990 and Black College Coach of the Year (1988) by Atlanta's 100 Percent Wrong Club.

Riley is a 1969 honors graduate, in Health and Physical Education, Riley was a Rhodes Scholarship nominee, who holds master's in Education Administration from the University of North Florida.



## The Jake Gaither Athletic Center

### Home of Florida A&M Basketball



Built in 1963, The Jake Gaither Athletic Center was named in honor of one of college football's great coaches, the late Hall of Fame mentor Alonzo Smith "Jake" Gaither.

Gaither Athletic Center actually encompasses the equivalent of over a quarter mile of real estate on the southwestern corner of the Florida A&M campus.

Designed for use by both athletics and physical education, the original facility consisted of a gymnasium for basketball, volleyball, activity classes and intramural events; an office center for the Health, Physical Education and Recreation department, instructors, coaches and athletic administration as well as classrooms.

The basketball facility, located on the northernmost corner of the complex, seats 3,365 fans.

Other facilities in the Gaither Center area include an eight-lane, all-weather track complex; a recently-expanded regulation 12-court tennis arena; an Olympic swimming and diving pool, complete with office and lockeroom accomodations and a women's softball stadium.
