

# TOPYS GAME BigBadJimvsBigBadJohn

Tonight marks a new era in the rivalry of Florida A&M and Tennessee State University as these two perennial powers square off in Bragg Stadium.

The Rattlers will be under the leadership of "big Jim" Williams who has chartered a 2-2 record thus far this season in defeating Western Carolina and Morris Brown while losing to North Carolina A&T and Alabama State.

The visiting Big Blue Tigers of Tennessee State are coached by Big John Merritt, the only coach to hold a decisive edge against the Rattlers in the series between the two teams.

Tennessee State has won 10 games while losing only four to the Rattlers. Neither game has ended in a tie and it has not been since 1968 when the Rattlers managed to defeat the Tigers (32-13).

Rattler Coach Big Jim Williams said he has his charges as prepared as possible for Tennessee State and the game should be a hard fought, exciting contest.

"You can always expect a rough game from Tennessee State," he said "They are a physical, wellcoached team that plays 60 minutes of football."

The last meeting between these two rivals is one the Rattlers would like to forget for the record books but they will want to remember it tonight. It was a year ago and Tennessee State took advantage

of every Rattler miscue to romp to a 50-8 victory.

"We remember last year," has been the chant of many of the Rattlers as they went about their routines, which were not so routine in preparing for tonight's game.

Meritt has earned his reputation as being one of the biggest, baddest coaches around and has compiled an enviable record to match his reputation. Williams is just in his first year as a college head coach but word is already out that Big Jim is just as bad as he is big.

Both football teams play the kind of football that reflects the personalities of their coaches. Tennessee State starts as its opponents from the opening whistle and never lets up until the final gun. The Rattlers are gaining the reputation as giant killers who back off from no one and will stare anyone in the eye and then whip him at his own game.

Of course, the reputations of Coaches Merritt and Williams are only football reputations and off the field they are two of the finest guys one could meet anywhere.

But few are concerned about their off--the-field personalities tonight. Folks from Tennessee State want Big Bad John and his Tigers to do it to the Rattlers again and one can bet that's what Big Bad John will be trying to do.

Tallahassee folks are counting on Big Bad Jim to set things straight since 1968 and Big Bad Jim has intentions of nothing less.

Off the field they're gentlemen. When the whistle blows tonight, though, it will be every man for himself if this fierce rivalry holds true to tradition. It'll boil down to the head-to-head confrontation between Big Bad Jim and Big Bad John.







# BIG



Florida A&M's football fortunes have fallen on lean times in recent years and the university reached into the ranks of its own products for the man everyone believes will mastermind the return of happy days to the Rattler gridiron.

James W. Williams, an iron-willed, All-American quarterback for the Rattlers in 1948, was named the new football coach at FAMU earlier this year, succeeding the late Clarence Montgomery.

Called "Big Jim" by his friends, Williams played four years for Florida A&M and has coached in high school and college as well as worked for the Department fo Health, Education and Welfare.

A native of Tampa, Williams entered Florida A&M in 1942 and was the lone freshman in the starting lineup under Bill Bell. Before the end of the season he had taken over the starting quarterbacktailback job, an act unheard of for a freshman under Bell's reign.

The Rattlers went undefeated that year (9-0-0) and won the national championship.

"Big Jim" entered the army the following year and didn't rejoin the Rattlers until 1946, but when he did return, Williams took back his job as starting quarterback and led the Rattlers to a 23-7 record over the next three years. At the end of his senior year, 1948, Williams was a first team Chicago Defender All-American.

His last three years at Florida A&M were spent under Jake Gaither and the legendary Rattler coach remembers Williams as "one of the best punters and passers we ever had."

After leaving A&M, Williams returned to Tampa as a high school coach at Don Thompson High School (the name was later changed to Blake). He remained there until 1965 and during his tenure as head coach he compiled a record of 88-11-3. His Blake teams were perennial state champions or runners-up.

Williams left Blake and joined the coaching staff at Southern University at Baton Rouge, La., in 1966 but stayed only one year as coach of the defense and kickers.

The riots flared up in Tampa in 1967 and Williams was called back to help quell the disturbance . . . and he did, as an official of HEW.

When the quiet was restored to Tampa, Williams returned to the Hillsborough County School System. For the past four years he was assistant coach at the University of Tampa.

One of the first things he did after taking over this spring was to commit himself to do "all I can to return the Rattlers to their winning tradition. I am making no promises or predictions but I am going to work hard, my staff is going to work hard and the players are going to work hard to try to revive the old Rattlerism here at FAMU."

Williams is married to the former Lillian Maxey of Tampa and they have one daughter who is married and living in Dallas, Texas.

### ROBERT "PETE" GRIFFIN Defensive Coordinator


Griffin returns to the Rattler staff after a year's absence. He came to the Rattlers as head line and defensive coach for football and track coach in 1944. He was an All-American center on Florida A&M's first national championship football team in 1938. He served as head coach of the Rattlers during the 1970 season following the retirement of Jake Gaither and led FAMU to a 5-5 record. "Pete" retired following the 1970-71 school year but rejoined the staff this spring. He is a native of Columbus, Ohio, and holds the Master of Arts degree from Ohio State University. He is hailed as one of the nation's top defensive coaches.

### DENNIS JEFFERSON Offensive Backs

Jefferson is another product of the Florida A&M football system. He came all the way up through the Rattler system, first at FAMU High and then at the University where he played quarterback from 1954 through 1956. A 1957 graduate of FAMU, Jefferson was head coach at Stone High in Melbourne, a backfield assistant at Mississippi Valley State College for a year and head coach at Shaw University before he decided to return to the Rattler Den. Jefferson, entering his third year as a Rattler coach, threw 11 TD passes his senior year in 1956.

### BOBBY LANG Linebackers

Lang is taking charge of the linebackers this season after having worked with the offensive interior line. He enters his seventh season as a member of the Rattler coaching staff. Lang was an ALL-SIAC performer during his playing days at FAMU where he earned his bachelor and masters degrees. He is assistant professor of physical education and head track coach. His track team won the SIAC championship from 1968 through 1970 and in 1968 his 440 relay team (Major Hazelton, Jim Ashcroft, Gene Milton and Nate James) became the first in history to retire the James C. Patterson Challenge Cup at the Penn Relays by winning it three consecutive years. Lang joined the FAMU staff in 1966 and is a native

### ROBERT "BOB" MUNGEN Defensive Secondary Mungen is a 1953 graduat

of Jacksonville.

Mungen is a 1953 graduate of FAMU and during his undergraduate days played end, halfback and quarterback for the Rattlers. He is head tennis coach and assistant professor of physical education. He earned his masters at Indiana University. Prior to joining the Rattler staff, Mungen was head coach at Edward Waters College in Jacksonville, Fla., and Knoxville (Tenn.) College. He is also in charge of the freshmen and works with the varsity punters and kickers. His defensive secondaries are known for their ruggedness, speed and hard hitting. Mungen is a native of Jacksonville and is in his 12th season as a Rattler coach.

### COSTA "POP" KITTLES Receivers

Another FAMU alumnus, Kittles has produced some top flight receivers. He has gained the reputation as being a specialist in developing ends. He enters his 20th season as a Rattler coach. Kittles earned All-American honors while playing end for the Rattlers in 1950. He also holds a masters from Ohio State and is an assistant professor of physical education. He is head baseball coach and has turned out perennially strong teams. Considered one of the most thorough coaches in the business, Kittles also is known for getting results in the classroom as well as on the football field or baseball diamond. He is a native of Jacksonville.

### JAMES "BILLY" OLIVER Offensive Line

Oliver enters his second year as a Rattler coach and scout. He was a member of the class of 49 at Florida A&M but never got the chance to play football for the Rattlers because of an injury. He has a wealth of experience, though. He coached five years at Palatka Central High School and another 10 years at Tallahassee Lincoln. Oliver was switched to his offensive assignment this season after having coached defense last year.

JOHN MERRITT Head Coach

"Big John," as he is affectionately called, is entering his 20th season as a college head coach. During this time he has experienced but one losing season. Five times Merritt has been selected as Coach-of-the-Year by both the Pittsburgh Courier and the 100 Percent Wrong Club of Atlanta, Georgia. This highly motivated, highly successful coach has dominated and revolutionized football in the predominantly black colleges throughout the decade of the 60's. During his nine-year reign at TSU, his Tiger juggernauts have amassed three National Championships three undefeated seasons and a won-lost record of 74-12-4; eighty-two of his former players have been drafted by the Pros. While Merritt is a master organizer and problem-solver, he still manages to find time to fill numerous speaking engagements. Holder of a Master's degree, he has done further study at the University of Cincinnati.

### GRIDIRON NOMENCLATURE/The Language of Football

Automatic—A change of the play called in the huddle by inserting into the starting commands a key phrase, word, or number that signals a new play. Called when the quarterback feels the defense is stacked against the first play or is vulnerable in some sector.

**Bootleg**—A sneak sweep by the quarterback, who fakes a hand-off then takes off around end alone and with the ball concealed against his hip.

**Button-hook**—A pass-catching maneuver in which the receiver proceeds down the field, then circles back sharply to face the passer and receive the ball.

Clipping—A block from the rear where contact is across the back of the leg of the player blocked.

Coffin Corner—The area formed by the goal line and the side line. A punt that goes out of bounds in this area, usually inside the 10-yard line, is called a "coffin corner kick."

**Draw**—A trap play in which the quaterback lures in defensive linemen by dropping back with the ball. When they are screened to the outside, the quarterback, or a back to whom he has handed off, takes the ball up the gap cleared by the onrushing defenders.

Fair Catch—An intent by a player by raising his arm not to advance a free kick. A player thus signaling cannot run with the ball nor can he be tackled.

Flip-Flop—The practice on offense of moving players from one side of the center to the other depending on whether "Formation right" or "Formation left" is called in the huddle.

"I" Formation—An attacking formation in which all four backs line up in a straight line behind the center. Usually one back will move out to a slot or wing position. This provides a balanced attack to either side with minimum advance notice to the defense.

Linebacker—A defensive player stationed just behind his line.

Monster—A floating linebacker, positioned either in or out of the line, on either side, or in any spot. His purpose is to confuse the opposition, varying his station and tactics from play to play.

Naked Reverse—A late-starting change-of-direction play, where, after large-scale initial flow of motion in one direction, the ball winds up in the possession of a back who goes in the other direction without blockers or interference.

Red Dog—When a linebacker leaves his position and crashes through the opposing line into the rival backfield to put pressure on the passer or to break up a play before it gets started. Also called "shooting the gap," "blitz," etc.

Roll-out—A sweeping run by the quarterback who, instead of dropping straight back on getting the ball, swings out in a wide arc to one side or another, ready to run or pass as the situation demands.

Shotgun—A spread-type attacking formation in which the quarterback lines up deep instead of under center, and the other backs are widely dispersed. It's an effective passing setup, and disconcerting on running plays when the defense isn't prepared.

Slot—The gap left when an end is moved out from the tackle on his side. A back stationed in this position is called a slot-back or slot-man. When the back is positioned outside the end he is called a wingback.

**Tight end**—An offensive end who lines up close to the tackle. When he lines up some distance out, he's called a "split end."

Trap—A maneuver in which the defensive lineman is permitted to ocme charging through and is blocked by surprise in the backfield. The play then goes through his vacated position.

### **PENALTIES**

- 1. OFFSIDE by either team; Violation of scrimmage or free kick formation; Encroachment on neutral zone—Loss of Five Yards.
- 2. ILLEGAL PROCEDURE, POSITION OR SUBSTITUTION Putting ball in play before Referee signals "Ready-for-Play"; Failure to complete substitution before play starts; Player out-of-bounds when scrimmage begins or on free kick formation; Failure to maintain proper alignment of offensive team when ball is snapped; False start or simulating start of a play; Taking more than two steps after Fair Catch is made; Player on line receiving snap; Free kick out-of-bounds—Loss of Five Yards.
- 3. ILLEGAL MOTION—Offensive player illegally in motion when ball is snapped—Loss of Five Yards.
- 4. ILLEGAL SHIFT—Failure to pause one full second in shift play—Loss of Five Yards.
- 5. ILLEGAL RETURN—Infraction of substitution rule—Loss of Five Yards.
- 6. DELAY OF GAME—Consuming more than 25 seconds in putting the ball in play after it is declared ready-for-play. Failure to remove injured player for whom excess timeout was granted; Crawling—Loss of Five Yards. Team not

- ready to play at start of either half—Loss of 15 Yards.
- 7. PERSONAL FOUL Tackling or blocking defensive player who has made fair catch; Piling on; Hurdling; Tripping; Grasping face mask of opponent; Tackling player out-of-bounds, or runing into player obviously out of play; Loss of 15 Yards. (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.)
- 8. CLIPPING-Loss of 15 Yards.
- 9. ROUGHING THE KICKER or holder—Loss of 15 Yards.
- 10. UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT—Striking an opponent with fist, forearm, elbow or locked hands; Kicking or kneeing—Loss of 15 Yards (offenders will be disqualified); Violation of rules during intermission; Illegal return of disqualified player; Coaching from side lines; Invalid signal for Fair Catch; Persons illegally on field—Loss of 15 Yards. (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.
- 11. ILLEGAL USE OF HANDS AND ARMS by offensive or defensive player—Loss of 15 Yeards.
- 12. INTENTIONAL GROUNDING of forward pass—Loss of Five Yards from spot of pass Plus Loss of Down.

- 13. ILLEGAL FORWARD PASS OR ILLEGAL HANDING BALL FORWARD—Loss of Five Yards from spot of foul Plus Loss of Down.
- 14. FORWARD PASS OR KICK CATCHING INTERFERENCE—Interference with opportunity of player of receiving team to catch a kick—Loss of 15 Yards. Interference by member of oftensive team on forward pass—Loss of 15 Yards Plus Loss of Down. Interference by defensive team on forward pass—Passing Team's Ball at Spot of Foul and First Down.
- 15. INELIGIBLE RECEIVER DOWN-FIELD ON PASS—Loss of 15 yards.
- 16. BALL ILLEGALLY TOUCHED, KICKED OR BATTED—Forward pass being touched by ineligible receiver beyond the line of scrimmage—Loss of 15 Yards from Spot of Preceding Down and Loss of a Down. Eligible pass receiver going out-of-bounds and later touching a forward pass—Loss of Down; Illegally kicking the ball—Loss of 15 Yards; Illegally kicking or batting a free ball—Offended team's ball at Spot of Foul.
- 17. INCOMPLETE FORWARD PASS
  —Penalty declined; No play or no score.
- 18. HELPING THE RUNNER, or interlocked interference—Loss of 15 Yards.







There are two new voices behind the mike this fall, in play-by-play announcer Ed Litter and color analyst Al Rock. Litter, a senior communications major at Florida State University, has two years of broadcast experience, working with FSU baseball and basketball and the Ft. Lauderdale native is pursuing a career in sportscasting.

Rock, who just graduated from FAMU in August, is presently a sales trainee in Atlanta. He knows all the Rattlers well, having worked closely with them as the FAMU statistician for the past three years.

The network will broadcast live all of the Rattler football games, both at home and on the road.



# UPDATING FAMU

### PERRY ELECTED PRESIDENT SALGCU

Florida A&M University president Dr. Banjamin L. Perry, Jr., has become the first black to be elected president of the Southern Association of Land Grant Colleges and Universities (SALGCU).

Dr. Perry, who had previously served on the executive committee of SALGCU, was elected during the annual meeting of the association in New Orleans recently. He will be replacing Florida State University president Stanley Marshall who served as president for 1971-72.

Dr. Perry's first act as president was to invite the SALGCU to hold their next meeting in Tallahassee. The invitation was accepted and the association will meet in Tallahassee on October 1, 1973.

As president, Dr. Perry will preside over all meetings during the next year, be responsible for calling meetings of the executive committee and work with the secretary of the association in planning next year's program.

The SALGCU serves as a cohesive force for a special segment of public higher education. It acts as a catalyst to bring the collective strength of the membership to bear on pressing educational issues which concerns each member. It also seeks to focus attention on the vast contributions State Universities andLand Grant Colleges have made to the nation.

Special emphasis is placed on the education of disadvantaged, curriculum revision, academic structure and university governance.

Dr. Perry is also president of the Florida Association of Colleges and Universities which includes all religious, non-religious, public and private, senior and community colleges in the state. His domain as )resident of the SALGCU includes 36 institutions in the southern states.

### NROTC DEDICATION SET

Formal Dedication ceremonies for Florida A&M University's new Naval Reserve Officers Training (NROTC) unit have been scheduled for Nov. 8 at FAMU's Lee Hall auditorium.

FAMU became one of only five predominately black universities in the country to offer a Naval ROTC program when the unit began operations on Sept. 1.

Some 45 Midshipmen have since been inducted into the program, which is under the direction of Cmdr. Benjamin T. Hacker.

Scheduled to speak at the dedication is Rear Adm. Samuel Gravely, of Washington, D.C., Commander of U.S. Naval Communications.

Gov. Reubin Askew is scheduled to speak at a luncheon immediately following the dedication in FAMU's Grand Ballroom.

### SOCIOLOGY DEPARTMENT RECEIVES \$57,600 GRANT

Special grant funding recently approved for Florida A&M University's sociology department should serve as an enticement for more students to enter the field of social welfare.

Dr. Charles U. Smith, FAMU sociology chairman, said a \$57,600 addition to the department's renewed Social Rehabilitative Services grant would provide \$1,200-a-year stipends for 48 students.

The money for the student stipends is part of an overall \$342,679 federal grant awarded to the sociology department through Florida's Division of Family Services.

Smith said more FAMU students would be encouraged to enter the social welfare program now that financial assistance is available. In the past, he said, many interested students were siphoned off into other fields where grants or loans were more easily obtained.

Federal funds have been, in the past, limited to social welfare students at the graduate level, Mrs. Warner said.


However, Smith said there had been "a shift in emphasis" among social welfare educators and agencies employing social workers. It was once thought you had to have a master's degree in social work, but now, they're finding many jobs can be handeled by persons with an undergraduate degree."

What the change means for students, according to Mrs. Warner, is that graduates of an accredited four-year program like FAMU's will find more jobs opening up to them.

The stipends will go to qualified juniors and seniors, including transfer students, who are majoring in social welfare and plan to pursue their major as a career choice after graduation.



Rey Robinson Back at Florida A&M ...sprinter missed race in Olympics

Reynaud Robinson may not be the invisible

Reynaud Robinson may not be invisible, but you couldn't prove it by any of the 12 or so newsmen who have tried to contact him since his return to the Florida A&M University campus three weeks ago.

Robinson, one of two U.S. Olympic track team sprinters who were eliminated after failing to show up for their race, returned to Tallahassee to register for the fall term.

Reporters were waiting anxiously for the junior health and physical education major, but none could get at him.

Robinson, a junior health and physical education major—left no address with the registrars office or with Coach Bobby Lang, his track mentor at FAMU, or with his father,

Booker Robinson of Lakeland. Nor did he return any of the many telephone calls made to him.

And if his fellow students at FAMU knew his whereabouts, they weren't telling.

"Rey dosen't want to be bothered," several of them said.

However last week, the elusive Robinson agreed to a taped interview with FAMU Sports Information Director Roosevelt Wilson for the FAMU Public Affairs Radio.

In the interview, Robinson told of his feelings on that fateful Thursday, Aug. 28 in Munich, Germany, when he and teammate Eddie Hart of Pittsburgh lost their chance for an Olympic Gold Medal.

"I was mad," Robinson said in the interview.

"This kind of thing is just not supposed to happen . . . I put the blame on Coach (Stan) Wright," he said.

"We (himself and his teammates Hart and Robert Taylor) had run the first rounds in the morning," Robinson continued. "Hart and I were to run again in the second heat and Taylor in the fifth that afternoon, so we went back to the village.

"I went back to the training room; Hart and Taylor went to their own rooms," he said.

Robinson said he saw coach Wright in the training room and asked him what time he'd be running the next round.

Robinson said his coach informed him he'd run at 6:15 p.m.

"That seemed kind of strange to be running so late," Robinson said. "It gets pretty cold over there late in the evenings."

Nevertheless, Robinson said he believed the coach and did not question the time he'd been given.

Robinson said he later rounded up Hart and Taylor, and they walked with him to ABC Television Center.

"I saw this TV set there at the center," Robinson said. "They were showing the 100-meters."

At first, he said, they thought the telecast was a taped version of the morning rounds. But an ABC monitor control man informed them it was live.

"ABC gave us a car so we could get to the stadium," he said. They sped away but when they arrived, Hart's and Robinson's heats had been run. Taylor only had time to jump out of his warmups, fasten on his track shoes and make it to the starting block for the fifth heat.

Taylor came in at 10.2 behind Russian speedster Valary Borzov who broke the wire at 10.1.

"I'd never had trouble with schedules before," Robinson said.

"If he had let me have my own schedule, I would have been there," Robinson stated.

Robinson said he has doubts that he'll run in the 21st Olympiad to be held in 1976.

"That's a long time off; I'll be 24-years-old then and will have graduated and found a job."

The wiry Robinson, however believes he will have the opportunity to run against Russian gold medal winner Borzov.

"I'm going out for the Pan African team and Borzov will probably be at the trials next summer in Ghana," he said.

Yes, Robinson believes he can beat the Russian, and could have if he'd had the chance to run in Munich.

With the fate of his own gold medal hopes, the questionable decision by officials in several events, and the tragedy that befell the Israle team, there was little enjoyment in the Olympics for Robinson.

Among those things he did find satisfying, however, were the travel (his first time outside the U.S.) in Norway and Italy during the Olympic games.


