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TODAY'S GAME

Can Big Jim Do It Again?

Jim Williams has a lot of respect for the Aggies of North Carolina A&T State University and the new Florida A&M University football coach hopes he can be as successful against the Aggies as a coach as he was a player.

Williams made his debut as a college football player against North Carolina A&T when he was a freshman quarterback for the Florida A&M Rattlers in 1942. He was, in fact the only freshman in the Rattlers' lineup.

Williams helped engineer the Rattlers to a 6-0 victory over A&T that day and the victory was the sixth in a row for the Rattlers who finished the season unbeaten and untied with a 9-0-0 record.

The thing Williams remembers most about the game was that A&T played the Rattlers tougher than any team had done previously that year. The Rattlers had beaten their previous five opponents by the combined score of 142-21, having scored an average of 28.4 points per game.

"They really played us tough that day," Williams said, "and we were fortunate to keep our victory string alive against them. They always play tough football. That's why I respect them so much."

Scouting reports show that the Aggies are tough again this year. They opened the season with a 13-0 shutout over always powerful Elizabeth City State and bounced back last week to crush

takes against them or it could be a long night for us."

Williams, of course, hopes to get his young Rattlers off on a winning note, but the win won't come easily. A&T has a bruising ground game behind the power running of Al Holland (33). Ironically, FAMU's forte a year ago was its bruising ground game behind the power running of James Rackley, who also wears No. 33.

The Aggies have another threat in their passing attack with quarterback Leonard Reliford (12) at the throttle while the rattlers' three-way quarterback battle between Rodney, Montgomery (3), Kenny Holt (10) and Clint Baker (11) is still virtually undecided.

The Rattlers will also be using a few freshmen in order to beef up both the offense and the defense. "We must get some help from the freshmen or we're in trouble," Williams said.

So the young, untested Rattlers open their 1972 campaign tonight hoping that talent, guts, and maybe a little luck will bring them out on top.

The biggest thing they have going for them, though, could be their coach.

Big Jim did it once. Can he do it again?

BIG JIM



Florida A&M's football fortunes have fallen on lean times in recent years and the university reached into the ranks of its own products for the man everyone believes will mastermind the return of happy days to the Rattler gridiron.

James W. Williams, an iron-willed, All-American quarterback for the Rattlers in 1948, was named the new football coach at FAMU earlier this year, succeeding the late Clarence Montgomery.

Called "Big Jim" by his friends, Williams played four years for Florida A&M and has coached in high school and college as well as worked for the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

A native of Tampa, Williams entered Florida A&M in 1942 and was the lone freshman in the starting lineup under Bill Bell. Before the end of the season he had taken over the starting quarterback-tailback job, an act unheard of for a freshman under Bell's reign.

The Rattlers went undefeated that year (9-0-0) and won the national championship.

"Big Jim" entered the army the following year and didn't rejoin the Rattlers until 1946, but when he did return, Williams took back his job as starting quarterback and led the Rattlers to a 23-7 record over the next three years. At the end of his senior year, 1948, Williams was a first team Chicago Defender All-American.

His last three years at Florida A&M were spent under Jake Gaither and the legendary Rattler coach remembers Williams as "one of the best punters and passers we ever had."

After leaving A&M, Williams returned to Tampa as a high school coach at Don Thompson High School (the name was later changed to Blake). He remained there until 1965 and during his tenure as head coach he compiled a record of 88-11-3. His Blake teams were perennial state champions or runners-up.

Williams left Blake and joined the coaching staff at Southern University at Baton Rouge, La., in 1966 but stayed only one year as coach of the defense and kickers.

The riots flared up in Tampa in 1967 and Williams was called back to help quell the disturbance ... and he did, as an official of HEW.

When the quiet was restored to Tampa, Williams returned to the Hillsborough County School System. For the past four years he was assistant coach at the University of Tampa.

One of the first things he did after taking over this spring was to commit himself to do "all I can to return the Rattlers to their winning tradition. I am making no promises or predictions but I am going to work hard, my staff is going to work hard and the players are going to work hard to try to revive the old Rattlerism here at FAMU."

Williams is married to the former Lillian Maxey of Tampa and they have one daughter who is married and living in Dallas, Texas.

THE RATTLER COACHING STAFF

ROBERT "PETE" GRIFFIN
Defensive Coordinator

Griffin returns to the Rattler staff after a year's absence. He came to the Rattlers as head line and defensive coach for football and track coach in 1944. He was an All-American center on Florida A&M's first national championship football team in 1938. He served as head coach of the Rattlers during the 1970 season following the retirement of Jake Gaither and led FAMU to a 5-5 record. "Pete" retired following the 1970-71 school year but rejoined the staff this spring. He is a native of Columbus, Ohio, and holds the Master of Arts degree from Ohio State University. He is hailed as one of the nation's top defensive coaches.

BOBBY LANG
Linebackers

Lang is taking charge of the linebackers this season after having worked with the offensive interior line. He enters his seventh season as a member of the Rattler coaching staff. Lang was an ALL-SIAC performer during his playing days at FAMU where he earned his bachelor and masters degrees. He is assistant professor of physical education and head track coach. His track team won the SIAC championship from 1968 through 1970 and in 1968 his 440 relay team (Major Hazelton, Jim Ashcroft, Gene Milton and Nate James) became the first in history to retire the James C. Patterson Challenge Cup at the Penn Relays by winning it three consecutive years. Lang joined the FAMU staff in 1966 and is a native of Jacksonville.

DENNIS JEFFERSON
Offensive Backs

Jefferson is another product of the Florida A&M football system. He came all the way up through the Rattler system, first at FAMU High and then at the University where he played quarterback from 1954 through 1956. A 1957 graduate of FAMU, Jefferson was head coach at Stone High in Melbourne, a backfield assistant at Mississippi Valley State College for a year and head coach at Shaw University before he decided to return to the Rattler Den. Jefferson, entering his third year as a Rattler coach, threw 11 TD passes his senior year in 1956.

ROBERT "BOB" MUNGEN
Defensive Secondary

Mungen is a 1953 graduate of FAMU and during his undergraduate days played end, halfback and quarterback for the Rattlers. He is head tennis coach and assistant professor of physical education. He earned his masters at Indiana University. Prior to joining the Rattler staff, Mungen was head coach at Edward Waters College in Jacksonville, Fla., and Knoxville (Tenn.) College. He is also in charge of the freshmen and works with the varsity punters and kickers. His defensive secondaries are known for their ruggedness, speed and hard hitting. Mungen is a native of Jacksonville and is in his 12th season as a Rattler coach.

COSTA "POP" KITTLES
Receivers

Another FAMU alumnus, Kittles has produced some top flight receivers. He has gained the reputation as being a specialist in developing ends. He enters his 20th season as a Rattler coach. Kittles earned All-American honors while playing end for the Rattlers in 1950. He also holds a masters from Ohio State and is an assistant professor of physical education. He is head baseball coach and has turned out perennially strong teams. Considered one of the most thorough coaches in the business, Kittles also is known for getting results in the classroom as well as on the football field or baseball diamond. He is a native of Jacksonville.

JAMES "BILLY" OLIVER
Offensive Line

Oliver enters his second year as a Rattler coach and scout. He was a member of the class of '49 at Florida A&M but never got the chance to play football for the Rattlers because of an injury. He has a wealth of experience, though. He coached five years at Palatka Central High School and another 10 years at Tallahassee Lincoln. Oliver was switched to his offensive assignment this season after having coached defense last year.

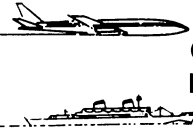

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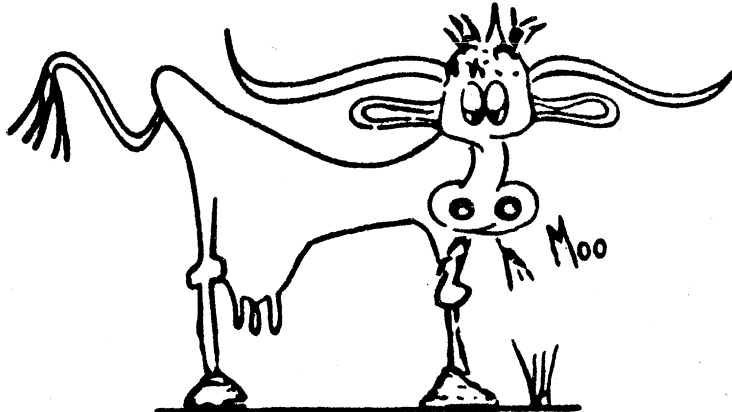

FAMU Adds Navy ROTC Unit

The United States Department of Navy has established a Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps, (NROTC) at Florida A&M University.

On August 1st, FAMU became the fourth predominantly black university in the nation to have a Naval ROTC unit. The University also has an Army ROTC unit that has commissioned 637 officers since 1948.

Commander Benjamin T. Hacker, commanding officer of the Naval unit and a staff of four officers including one Marine officer and four enlisted support personnel including a marine, have already begun preparations for an estimated 30 to 50 students expected to become midshipmen in the US Naval Reserve.

According to Commander Hacker, at least 20 of the students are expected to be Naval Scholarship students. "We have approximately eight students who have already been selected through competitive examinations, he said, and as commanding officer, it will be my privilege to appoint the other 12 scholarship awards."

Midshipmen in the NROTC scholarship program receive all fees, tuition, books, and \$100 a month during their entire college career not to exceed four

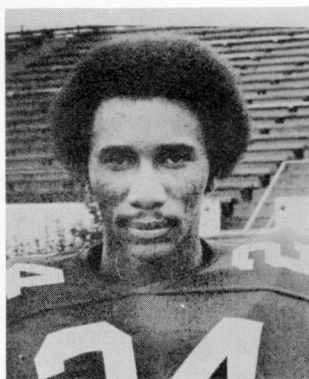
years. They are required to take three summer training periods and must serve at least four years on active duty after commissioning.

Midshipmen who are not on scholarship enter under the contract program. They are required to complete only one summer training period to take place between their junior and senior years, receive the \$100 a month subsistence allowance only during their junior and senior years and are required to serve only three years active duty after commissioning.

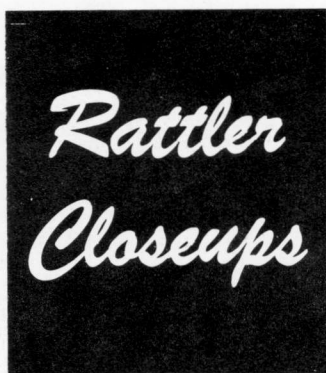
"All NROTC midshipmen lead the same campus life as other undergraduates," said Hacker, a native of Springfield, Ohio. "They make their own arrangements for board and room, and may participate in any extracurricular activities that do not interfere with their Naval science requirements.

Upon completion of their NROTC training, the midshipmen have a choice of being commissioned in the Navy as ensigns (equivalent to second lieutenants in the other military services) or as second lieutenants in the US Marine Corps.

There will be three additional officers and one additional enlisted person added to the staff during the next fiscal year.



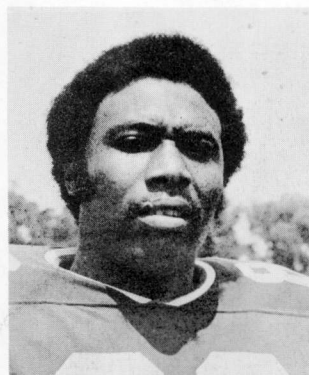

Murray Neely carries the responsibility of developing the strong Aggie offensive blocking line. In his 22nd year at A&T, Neely also coaches the A&T trackmen.



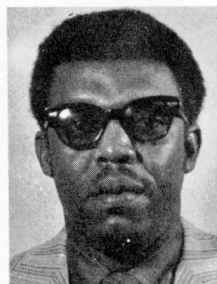

SCHOOL OF PHARMACY RECEIVES LARGE GRANT

The Florida A&M University School of Pharmacy has received nearly \$500,000 to design a recruitment program that will stimulate interest in pharmacy as a career.

The department of Health, Education and Welfare has awarded pharmacy Dean Dr. Ira C. Robinson \$469,814 to be awarded during a three-year period. The funds will be specifically used to recruit minority students and students from low income groups.

The school of pharmacy will receive \$95,601 for the 1972-73 fiscal year. The award will be increased to \$180,910 for the fiscal year 1973-74 and an additional increase to \$193,303 for the 1974-75 fiscal year.

Robert Scarbough, assistant dean of the school of pharmacy estimates that more than 100 students will be added to the enrollment as a result of the grant. "We now have approximately 175 students enrolled," he said, "and I expect that we should have an enrollment of nearly 300 students by the 1974-75 school year."

According to Robinson, career stimulation programs in the past have proved to be inadequate and a more vigorous program that will include high school and junior college staff throughout Florida and selected areas in Georgia and Alabama are needed.

Robinson or a member of his faculty plans to visit annually more than 200 high schools and junior colleges within a 500 mile radius of Tallahassee. A consulting firm will be hired to aid in creating films, slides and other recruitment aids that will encourage students to consider a career in one of the health professions.

A unique aspect of this program, Robinson says, will be a summer program for high school graduates

with science deficiencies who are interested in pharmacy. The summer institute will emphasize courses in chemistry, biology, mathematics and English. According to data obtained by Robinson, these are the critical areas for students planning to enter the school of pharmacy.

"Minority youth," Robinson said, "tend to identify with an apparently successful member in his community. In pharmacy there is an extreme shortage of minority pharmacists in disadvantaged neighborhoods, thus it becomes very hard when you attempt to acquaint the potential pharmacy student with someone he can look up to in his own community."

To combat this problem, Robinson will appoint a project director who will be responsible for dividing the project area into seven districts. Each district will have seminars where guidance personnel, science teachers and related personnel from high schools, junior colleges and community programs will be invited.

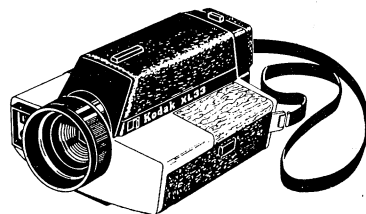
The FAMU school is one of only two pharmacy schools in the country that has a year round program which will allow students to graduate in four years instead of five.

Graduate courses have been added to the curriculum and the entire school has moved into a new \$2 million building that is filled with the latest in modern scientific equipment.

Robinson said that FAMU was one of two pharmacy schools in the nation which received funds from special project grants by HEW in 1970-71.



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Football Fans Invited to Support College Hall of Fame Gridiron Program

Special Gifts and Endowment Campaign Continues

Fulfilling a pledge to get the National Football Foundation's College Football Hall of Fame project moving in 1972, the Foundation's Executive Committee authorized the purchase of a six-floor, sixty-five room former mansion in New York City to serve as its National Headquarters and to house its College Football Hall of Fame. Located at 17 East 80th Street, the building is close to the Metropolitan Museum.

Designed by Cass Gilbert, the architect who designed the Woolworth Building, and built in 1908 as a residence for financier Paul Warburg, the building will provide 25,000 square feet. An impressive staircase leads from the spacious entrance hall to the lecture room-auditorium on the second floor and the library on the third floor. Both rooms extend the full width of the forty-two foot building, which also contains a fully-equipped projection room. Two elevators serve the six floors and basement.

The lease with Rutgers University has been cancelled by mutual agreement of Rutgers University and NFF officials. Rutgers President Dr. Edward Bloustein has wished the Foundation officials well.

NFF Chairman Vincent Draddy said: "Building costs are continually escalating. We have succeeded in raising almost \$2 million of the \$5.5 million it would take, at today's costs, to build and equip the structure we had planned. Recognizing the nation's changing economic and social conditions, the Foundation's Executive Committee decided to change the Foundation's priorities and concentrate on our educational and leadership programs on behalf of the youth of America. The building will enable us to pursue these goals without delay. The building's immediate availability offers us also an opportunity to utilize our Hall of Fame exhibits in programs that will emphasize the educational aspects of college football, intercollegiate athletics, competitive campus activities, and the developing of well rounded scholar-athletes for leadership positions throughout the country. In this way, we shall serve the present and the



National Football Foundation Headquarters — will house College Football Hall of Fame.

future, as well as the past."

Concluding, Draddy said: "We will need to continue our Special Gifts and General Endowment campaign so that we may have the necessary funds to fulfill our objectives. We appreciate the fact that many colleges and universities throughout the country are asking that their fans participate in this tax-deductible effort. 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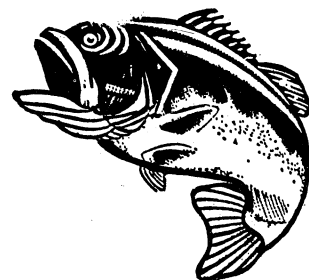
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UPDATING FAMU

PEACE CORPS PROGRAM

Florida A&M University has been selected as one of five institutions in the country to train minority Peace Corps volunteers for service as English teachers in African countries—a program leading to the master's degree for participants. The University has received a grant of \$97,950 from ACTION to fund the project. ACTION is the umbrella organization for the Peace Corps, VISTA and other citizen service corps, created by President Nixon. Twenty-five interns will be enrolled in the project which will begin on Nov. 2, according to project director, Dr. Leslie Wilson, associate professor of foreign languages at FAMU. The volunteers who must have a bachelor's degree and proficiency in French, will spend two quarters in training, part of which will involve intensive language studies at St. Thomas in the Virgin Islands. After completing their studies at FAMU, they will spend the summer in Africa for cultural studies, then be assigned for two years duty as Peace Corps volunteers in either Senegal or Nigera. When they have successfully completed their two-year stint in the Peace Corps, they will receive master's degrees from FAMU. Although the project is geared primarily for blacks, Dr. Wilson said that other minority applicants, including indigent whites, would be eligible. Preference will be given to Florida applicants.

SEALS, BLACKWELL IN Who's WHO

Two FAMU staff members have been selected to appear in Marquis Who's Who publications. Dr. Rupert G. Seals, dean of the School of Agriculture and Home Economics, has been selected to appear in Who's Who in America, and Dr. A. Louise Blackwell has been selected to appear in Who's Who of American Women. Dr. Blackwell is currently on a 10-month leave of absence from the University on a Fullbright grant to lecture in American literature at the University of Sao Paulo, Brazil. She also was appointed last fall to a six-year term on the National Council of Humanities. Dr. Seals recently returned from a two-week trip to the developing country of Nepal in South Asia where he participated in a study to determine the feasibility of establishing an agricultural college in the country.

GAYLES AUTHORS BOOK

Dr. Anne R. Gayles, chairman of the department of secondary education at FAMU, is the author of a book, entitled *Instructional Planning in the Secondary School: Selected Reading*, published by the David McKay Company, Inc. The book includes a compilation of 100 articles dealing with the major processes of learning and teaching at the secondary level. Articles range from the societal context of the educative process to the writing of daily lesson plans. Dr. Gayles describes the book as an attempt to present a design for classroom teaching with special emphasis on effective instructional planning which she calls the key to quality teaching and learning.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE PROGRAM


The Department of Sociology at FAMU is interested in getting sociology majors interested in careers in the criminal justice field. To do the job, the department has been granted \$202,000 from the United States Justice Department Law Enforcement Education Program (LEEP). The LEEP program was created to provide financial aid for students preparing for careers in law enforcement and in-service personnel already employed by law enforcement agencies. Michael Safar, assistant professor of sociology, who will coordinate the LEEP funds, said that all of the \$202,000 will go for loans and grants to students. He said, "Florida is a critical area for blacks in the correction field. There is a tremendous gap in Florida between the number of black inmates and qualified black correction officers." In order to become eligible for the program, students must major in sociology and minor in corrections.

ENGINEER ON CAMPUS

An engineer from the IBM Corporation in Lexington, Ky., has volunteered to spend an academic year as a professor at FAMU. Dr. Thomas Jackson, dean of the school of Technology said that Dr. David A. Beaty will join the technology faculty for the fall quarter as a part of the IBM faculty loan program. Dr. Beaty will teach courses in engineering and will assist the technology faculty in revising and restructuring the engineering program in order to prepare students for problems they will face when they graduate. The IBM faculty loan program allows IBM employees with specific competencies to take a year's leave and teach in minority colleges throughout the country. Dr. Jackson said, "This contact with private industry will be invaluable to our students. The classroom is very important but when they can have day to day contact with a representative from the private sector and get first hand knowledge of the problems they will face and how to solve them, they will leave with a distinct advantage."

FOSTER RECEIVES MEDAL

Dr. William P. Foster, chairman of the department of music and director of bands at FAMU, has been selected as a recipient of the Kappa Kappa Psi Distinguished Service to Music Medal. Kappa Kappa Psi, a national honorary band fraternity, made its "highest" award to Dr. Foster as distinctive recognition and appreciation for his work in the field of The Modern Marching Band. Dr. Foster, who is also president elect of the Florida Music Educators Association, was recommended for the award by the "student alumni currently active in the collegiate band field."



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Rattlers No. 4 In Nation's Scoring Machines

If they ever write a book called The Scoring Machine, the story could revolve around the West Chester football team of Pennsylvania.

The Golden Rams lead the nation's college-division teams with 32.5 points per regular-season game over the last ten seasons, the first three under Jim Binder and the last seven under Bob Mitten, and always emphasize wide-open football.

Florida A&M University's Rattlers rank fourth in the nation on the same list.

"We're never afraid to take a chance," says new head coach John Furlow, who assisted both Bonder and Mitten. "We like to score quickly. Our teams move more like a racing car than a model-T."

And they're getting even faster, averaging 35.6 points per game over the last five seasons and climaxed by their 10-year high of 42.0 last season. The Golden Rams topped 50 points 18 times in the decade, 12 in the last five seasons.

"We usually go for the big play right away, on our first series of the game," Furlow says. "The kids have a tremendous amount of confidence. I don't think they have ever come off the field thinking they couldn't run something."

To show West Chester's explosiveness, the Golden Rams averaged only eight more rushing-passing plays than their opponents over the decade (70.2 to 62.2) but gained almost twice as many yards (377.7 total-offense yards per game to 199.9).

Tennessee State took the runnerup spot from Grambling by averaging 41.9 points last season (including a 41-35 victory over Grambling). The 10-year leaders:

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Automatic—A change of the play called in the huddle by inserting into the starting commands a key phrase, word, or number that signals a new play. Called when the quarterback feels the defense is stacked against the first play or is vulnerable in some sector.

Bootleg—A sneak sweep by the quarterback, who fakes a hand-off then takes off around end alone and with the ball concealed against his hip.

Button-hook—A pass-catching maneuver in which the receiver proceeds down the field, then circles back sharply to face the passer and receive the ball.

Clipping—A block from the rear where contact is across the back of the leg of the player blocked.

Coffin Corner—The area formed by the goal line and the side line. A punt that goes out of bounds in this area, usually inside the 10-yard line, is called a "coffin corner kick."

Draw—A trap play in which the quarterback lures in defensive linemen by dropping back with the ball. When they are screened to the outside, the quarterback, or a back to whom he has handed off, takes the ball up the gap cleared by the onrushing defenders.

Fair Catch—An intent by a player by raising his arm not to advance a free kick. A player thus signaling cannot run with the ball nor can he be tackled.

Flip-Flop—The practice on offense of moving players from one side of the center to the other depending on whether "Formation right" or "Formation left" is called in the huddle.

"I" Formation—An attacking formation in which all four backs line up in a straight line behind the center. Usually one back will move out to a slot or wing position. This provides a balanced attack to either side with minimum advance notice to the defense.

Linebacker—A defensive player stationed just behind his line.

Monster—A floating linebacker, positioned either in or out of the line, on either side, or in any spot. His purpose is to confuse the opposition, varying his station and tactics from play to play.

Naked Reverse—A late-starting change-of-direction play, where, after large-scale initial flow of motion in one direction, the ball winds up in the possession of a back who goes in the other direction without blockers or interference.

Red Dog—When a linebacker leaves his position and crashes through the opposing line into the rival backfield to put pressure on the passer or to break up a play before it gets started. Also called "shooting the gap," "blitz," etc.

Roll-out—A sweeping run by the quarterback who, instead of dropping straight back on getting the ball, swings out in a wide arc to one side or another, ready to run or pass as the situation demands.

Shotgun—A spread-type attacking formation in which the quarterback lines up deep instead of under center, and the other backs are widely dispersed. It's an effective passing set-up, and disconcerting on running plays when the defense isn't prepared.

Slot—The gap left when an end is moved out from the tackle on his side. A back stationed in this position is called a slot-back or slot-man. When the back is positioned outside the end he is called a wingback.

Tight end—An offensive end who lines up close to the tackle. When he lines up some distance out, he's called a "split end."

Trap—A maneuver in which the defensive lineman is permitted to come charging through and is blocked by surprise in the backfield. The play then goes through his vacated position.

PENALTIES

1. **OFFSIDE** by either team; Violation of scrimmage or free kick formation; Encroachment on neutral zone—Loss of Five Yards.

2. **ILLEGAL PROCEDURE, POSITION OR SUBSTITUTION**—Putting ball in play before Referee signals "Ready-for-Play"; Failure to complete substitution before play starts; Player out-of-bounds when scrimmage begins or on free kick formation; Failure to maintain proper alignment of offensive team when ball is snapped; False start or simulating start of a play; Taking more than two steps after Fair Catch is made; Player on line receiving snap; Free kick out-of-bounds—Loss of Five Yards.

3. **ILLEGAL MOTION**—Offensive player illegally in motion when ball is snapped—Loss of Five Yards.

4. **ILLEGAL SHIFT**—Failure to pause one full second in shift play—Loss of Five Yards.

5. **ILLEGAL RETURN**—Infraction of substitution rule—Loss of Five Yards.

6. **DELAY OF GAME**—Consuming more than 25 seconds in putting the ball in play after it is declared ready-for-play; Failure to remove injured player for whom excess timeout was granted; Crawling—Loss of Five Yards. Team not

ready to play at start of either half—Loss of 15 Yards.

7. **PERSONAL FOUL**—Tackling or blocking defensive player who has made fair catch; Piling on; Hurdling; Tripping; Grasping face mask of opponent; Tackling player out-of-bounds, or running into player obviously out of play; Loss of 15 Yards. (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.)

8. **CLIPPING**—Loss of 15 Yards.

9. **ROUGHING THE KICKER** or holder—Loss of 15 Yards.

10. **UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT**—Striking an opponent with fist, forearm, elbow or locked hands; Kicking or kneeling—Loss of 15 Yards (offenders will be disqualified); Violation of rules during intermission; Illegal return of disqualified player; Coaching from side lines; Invalid signal for Fair Catch; Persons illegally on field—Loss of 15 Yards. (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.)

11. **ILLEGAL USE OF HANDS AND ARMS** by offensive or defensive player—Loss of 15 Yards.

12. **INTENTIONAL GROUNDING** of forward pass—Loss of Five Yards from spot of pass Plus Loss of Down.

13. **ILLEGAL FORWARD PASS OR ILLEGAL HANDING BALL FORWARD**—Loss of Five Yards from spot of foul Plus Loss of Down.

14. **FORWARD PASS OR KICK CATCHING INTERFERENCE**—Interference with opportunity of player of receiving team to catch a kick—Loss of 15 Yards. Interference by member of offensive team on forward pass—Loss of 15 Yards Plus Loss of Down. Interference by defensive team on forward pass—Passing Team's Ball at Spot of Foul and First Down.

15. **INELIGIBLE RECEIVER DOWN-FIELD ON PASS**—Loss of 15 yards.

16. **BALL ILLEGALLY TOUCHED, KICKED OR BATTED**—Forward pass being touched by ineligible receiver beyond the line of scrimmage—Loss of 15 Yards from Spot of Preceding Down and Loss of a Down. Eligible pass receiver going out-of-bounds and later touching a forward pass—Loss of Down; Illegally kicking the ball—Loss of 15 Yards; Illegally kicking or batting a free ball—Offended team's ball at Spot of Foul.

17. **INCOMPLETE FORWARD PASS**—Penalty declined; No play or no score.

18. **HELPING THE RUNNER**, or interlocked interference—Loss of 15 Yards.
